BONDI BEAT WARNI

Police in Sydney have warned of the dangers of the Bondi Heads and Notts Avenue toilets.

The area has a bad reputation for 'muggings'. At least one death has been reported over the last couple of years.

On the night of Tuesday, 7th November, at about 11.30 p.m., a Stallion staff reporter was called to the Notts Avenue toilet by a camp guy. He reported that a man was unconscious and badly injured in the 'ladies' section and that he had called the police. The camp guy, who had been arrested for loitering in a similar area in Melbourne, did not wish to get involved. The reporter, who had seen two of the four 'bashers' earlier in the evening, agreed to institute the complaint for him.

The injured man was taken to hospital by ambulance where he was found to have a broken jaw, broken cheekbone and a broken collarbone. He was not a pretty sight. His face and head were extensively cut.

Detectives told the reporter, after a search of the Bondi Beach area, that two similar beatings had occurred the previous evening. Both victims had to be hospitalised.

The Police are genuinely concerned about these brutal assaults and have difficulty in investigating the crimes since the camp crowd are frightened to get involved. The pacifist nature of the average camp guy means that many people witnessing assaults do not come forward to help police with their enquiries.




WAVE OF VIOLENCE
