NEW SUMMER CAMPAIGN

The NSW Lesbian and Gay Anti-Violence Project launches its most extensive safety campaign ever this month, with a series of posters and advertisements on the theme of Violence Can Happen: Just Be Aware.

The campaign includes images designed to target the Asian and Koori communities, as well as dealing with abuse ranging from physical violence to verbal harassment in the workplace. School-aged young people, transgenders and situation-specific areas of risk are also targeted. Anti-Violence Project coordinator, Bruce Grant, said the campaign is timed to coincide with the increase in anti-lesbian and homophobic activity which takes place with the onset of summer.

Grant said: "Unfortunately there's a high correlation between crime rates and summer months, with more people out on the streets and vulnerable to abuse or attack. This is our fourth annual summer campaign, incorporating seven images which will go out on posters, leaflets and in the print media."

The Anti-Violence Project, which is based in Sydney, records almost 200

Chief criminologist calls for action now

MINISTERS COMMIT TO VIOLENCE PREVENTION


The Australian Institute of Criminology's (AIC) First National Conference on Violence Against Gays and Lesbians concluded in Sydney in October, with calls for the government to fund anti-violence projects in each state and territory.

Speakers at the event, which was held at the University of Sydney between October 27–28, included Federal Justice Minister Duncan Kerr, NSW Police Minister Paul Whelan and President of the NSW Anti-Discrimination Board, Chris Puplick. After a brief welcome to conference participants by AIC Director, Dr Adam Graycar, the opening address was delivered by Duncan Kerr.


He said: "As the Federal Justice Minister I am accutely aware of the work ahead of all Australian governments before we can claim that justice is as available to gays and lesbians as it is to some others in our community . . . society has shown time and time again that it can turn a blind eye to criminal violence by making the victim legally and socially invisible.

"The Commonwealth Government won't waiver in its commitment to prevent and deal effectively with violence against all Australians, including gays and lesbians, and to provide a leading role in Commonwealth/State initiatives in the area."


In his speech on the second day of the conference, Paul Whelan made three important announcements concerning police responses to homophobic and anti-lesbian violence. (to page 2)



State Attorney-General, Jeff Shaw, announced in January a \$50,000 grant to the Lesbian and Gay Anti-Violence Project (AVP) from its Juvenile Crime Prevention Division budget. The money will go towards a new \$85,000 campaign designed to reduce the level of involvement of young people in violence against lesbians and gays by contributing to a social climate which encourages and supports young people to take a stand against anti-lesbian and homophobic violence.


The idea is based on a similar campaign conducted by the Human Rights and Equal Opportunities Commission, which addressed youth attitudes towards racism.
