Apologies for not responding earlier. I think the original plan was for an article to be written about the deathsand perhaps contrary findings for the Australian Police Journal. If youwere considering analysing the approach by Flinders regarding some of theinaccuracies in classifications, especially those in the paedophile range, I would be happy to arrange a meeting beforehand - if that is appropriate.

From a purely policing perspective,I would like to develop a simplified bias crime indicator for operational police because both the Parrabell and academic teams had difficulty categorising these matters consistently with the 10 bias crime indicators model then, and now, used by the NSWPF.

I was not aware of the additional linkbetween Flinders and related criminal activity, albeit I was aware thatDerek Dalton had published material in related areas. I am not sure thatyou anticipated anything further than contributing to an article, howeverif you think further development of a bias crimes indicator is within yourscope, I am interested in your thoughts.

Areyou aware of these murders in South Australia in late 1970's/early 1980's. It is proposed that a group of men would target young men, gay menand young boys (one victim was just 14) raped and then murdered. TheForensic Science department at Flinders university was involved in examiningDNA linked to this crime. I thought this was interesting in lightof the Criminology Department at Flinders university linking the gay murdersin Sydney to paedophilia. I suspect the criminology team at Flindersmay have been

influenced by this SA case when they looked at your StrikeForce Parrabell report. I suspect drawing links between the two caseswill have benefited the Flinders academics more than it would have NSWPF.

Hello Everyone,

I have been through the reportand thought I would share some thoughts with you. The decision then is next steps.

I will try and capture mythoughts/observations below, but if we need to have a chat about this,I can arrange an online meeting through our great CSU technology. Sohere goes (hope my stream of consciousness makes sense):

- 1. Both the NSWPF report and Flinders report as stand-alone reports are both good, the problem lies with the fact they are two stand-alone reports that havebeen brought together and compared. Both reports use two different analytical frameworks, albeit on the same 'dataset' but as to be expected two different analytical frameworks have garnered two different findings. Comparing the two sets of findings is problematic/wrong.
- 2. Basedon the terms of reference it would seem that what's missing here is external validity.... That being an external assessor/researcher to SFP, who would/shouldhave conducted the same approach SFP used to assessing the homicides seeif they come up with the same results this would have been a more fruitful exercise in terms of a comparison.
- 3. Iam not convinced you can draw any conclusion about police practice andinvestigation other than what is done today is different. The reviewby Flinders seems to be examining police practice of 1970's, 1980's and1990's through a 2017 lens of course it is different, forensic tools,investigative interviewing as well as society and culture. If youwant to examine if police did not look into these cases with enough vigour/withoutprejudice than we would need to look at other homicides during this timeframe to see how the police conducted the investigations. Youcould do this broadly, and/or by looking at other homicide 'hate crimes' where race, disability was present.... If you look at other murders and find there is difference then there is a scope to draw conclusions/implicationsof what that difference is/was.
- 4. Theterm hate crime/bias crime has been used/applied retrospectively thisterms first made its way into legislation in 1981 in Washingtonand Oregon, over subsequent years the terms became more widely used –but over time, NSWPF solved more of these murders than they didn't…so it could be argued as 'hate crime' became more of a mainstream term,it was reflected in practice…hence the improvements in solving the cases. In hind sight if we view these crimes as hate crimes, let's comparethen to other hate crime murders and make an assessment of good/bad/indifferencepractice.
- 5. Ithought the leap to and link to paedophiles was strange, bizarre, unwarrantedand not justified. Flinders seemed to support this category basedon a 60 year old coming onto a 17 year old lad.... This isn't paedophile. It may contravene social norms re: the age difference but it's notpaedophillia. Again in the 1970'/1980's age of consent was different/homosexualityillegal in NSW for some of this time, but Paedophilia isdefined as an ongoingsexual attraction to pre-pubertal children, so 13 years and younger, nota 17 year old. Was there evidence in the case files of any of thesemen engaging with children in a sexual manner? Flinders noted earlyin their report that they were solely engaged in an evidence based approach, yet used justification that some people in society viewed gay men as paedophilesand therefore 'we will use this as a category' for analytical purposes....This was all bit strange to me...

There are a couple of thingsthat can be done here:

- 1. Lookat the categories NSWPF SFP generated and how they cross reference to the categories Flinders have. So of the 8 men who were claimed to be bias homicides by NSWPF, where do they feature in Flinders list do they make up part of the 17 of anti-bias crimes, or have they been categorised les where and why.... As these seems unclear. The datasets when presented and compared in the Flinders report don't do this, probably because you can't;
- 2. Takethe NSWPF hate crime matrix used to classify these homicides, and lookat other hate crime homicides at the time to evaluate hate crime murders and how they were investigated as well as changes over time (this couldhelp support a validation of this matrix Flinders claimed it was unreliable as there was no evidence for it);
- 3. Getsomeone to review the gay homicides using the same approach as NSWPF to support/refute the conclusions made but using the same analytical framework.

Not sure if the above makessense.... It does in my head, but not sure I have captured it well here. Also, Tony/Wayne, in previous emails you have noted your observations, would be good to know what you want out of this process and potential nextsteps, now that I have properly read the report.

Hope the above helps and is not totally useless ☺

I have done some preliminary comparisonwork around differences in findings between Strike Force Parrabell andthe Academic Review. I am happy to share my additional statistics and findings with you when the time is right. For example - the professors separatedanti-gay animus from anti-paedophile animus, whereas police did not, resultingin several cases with contrary findings.

One case was particularly contentious (Dempsey)because of contrary findings for reasons related to the weight attached to different portions of evidence.

I also have a list of 86 case summaries, which are half-page descriptions of individual deaths including facts and circumstances drawn from evidence within case files. These summaries werenot released publicly because many are especially gruesome. They were released conditionally to media reporters with a caveat that they were not for further distribution. I can also provide you that material.
