Description:	John MILICEVIC was a 45 year old male who was believed to be homosexual. He worked as a Banking Messenger for Westpac Banking Corporation. He was murdered in Rushcutters Bay Park which is a known beat location by NP124 NP125 and NP126 MP126 NP126 NP124 was 15 years old, NP125 and NP126 Were 17 years old. All three young persons were heterosexual and not known to MILICEVIC. MILECEVIC was found in Rushcutters Bay Park with two stab wounds to the back and one to the mouth and taken to Hospital where he died after a second surgery due to a punctured lung. It is unknown which young person stabbed MILECEVIC. NP124 was charged with murder, pled guilty to manslaughter and sentenced to 7 years imprisonment with a non parole of 3 years. NP125 was charged and convicted of murder and was sentenced to 12 years in Juvenile Detention with a non parole of 8 years. NP126 was charged with murder, pled guilty to accessory after the fact of murder, and sentenced to 3 years good behaviour supervised with a \$1000.00 surety.

John MILICEVIC, aged 45 years was murdered in Rushcutters Bay Park, Rushcutters Bay on the 15 August 1993. Detective Senior Constable PAYNE who investigated the murder made the following comment in a progress report addressed to the Homicide Unit at Major Crime South Sydney, "The deceased is a single man who is employed with Westpac Bank, North Sydney. He resides on his own and is believed to be homosexual" (OD-236). There are no other background statements information available to review regarding MILICEVIC'S sexuality, so the opinion of the Detectives who investigated the matter is relied upon when making this assessment. Offenders NP124
NP125 and NP126
were charged with the murder of MILICEVIC. Both NP125 and NP124 were homophobic and expressed a strong dislike for homosexual men in their interviews with Police and also to secondary witnesses. NP125 was asked by Detective Constable KIRKMAN during his interview to describe what MILICEVIC said to him. prior to NP125 stabbing him. NP125 stated, "Oh I think it was something like vou know, um cunts or something. I, I can't remember. But it isn't, wasn't pleasant. I didn't think it sounded pleasant anyway. And um he sort of had an accent and so I just called him a fag. He just, what he said to me I just didn't take it well, at all. Cause I'm a homophobic mate, I'm scared of 'em. I just started freaking out real bad. And ah he just wanted to give me a kiss mate and I just and I didn't like it. So I punched him and ah" (ER-113). A statement supplied by the offender NP125 ('S support person 1100 1100 thoroughly sums up NP125 attitude towards homosexual males. 1100 stated, "During one of the suspensions during the interview, Detective KIRKMAN left the interview room and I was again alone with the young person NP125 He said: "I hate fags, my brother, well he's not my real brother, but I consider him to be my brother was attacked by fags"" (ST-597). This attitude towards homosexual males is also represented in the comments made by co-offender NP124 in his interview with Detective Constable KUHNKE, when NP124 is asked to

John MILICEVIC, aged 46 years was murdered at Rushcutters Bay Park, Rushcutters Bay on the 15 August 1993. Detective Senior Constable PAYNE who investigated the murder made the following comment in a progress report addressed to the Homicide Unit at Major Crime South Sydney, "The deceased is a single man who is employed with Westpac Bank, North Sydney. He resides on his own and is believed to be homosexual." There are no other background statements or information available to review regarding MILICEVIC'S sexuality, so the opinion of the Detectives who investigated the matter is relied upon when making this assessment. It is clear that there is a high level of animosity on behalf of NP125 and NP124 towards homosexual males. A statement provided by NP125 support person, 1100 thoroughly summed up NP125 Statitude towards homosexual males. 1100 stated, "During one of the suspensions during the interview, Detective KIRKMAN left the interview room and I was again alone with the young person NP125. He said: "I hate fags, my brother, well he's not my real brother, but I consider him to be my brother was attacked by fags." NP124 mother, 199 outlined her son's hatred of homosexual males in her statement to Police. 199 said, NP124 has a dislike towards homosexuals. He told me this a couple of weeks ago."		

2. Comments, Written Statements, Gestures **Prompts** Comment Both NP124 and NP125 made numerous bias related comments in regards to MILICEVIC, as well as Bias related comments, written statements or gestures were made by the POI displaying a bias or phobia towards homosexual males in general. NP124 Interview with Detective Constable Steve KUHNKE indicated that the group had all attended Rushcutters Bay Park to commit a robbery and the likely target was a homosexual male. Detective KUHNKE said, "What is your side of the story?" NP124 replied, "We were looking for someone to roll for some money up at the cross. We decided to go to Rushcutters Bay because we knew it was a known homosexual gathering place. Three of us walked down there, we kept walking along water's edge along the park and uh we sat down for a while and had a few cigarettes and then we got up and we kept walking along the path, this man was walking in the opposite direction. We kept walking and when he got 5 metres in front of us I looked at him and he looked at me, and he licked his lips like a fag and when he got in front of me I king hit him in the left temple. Uh he fell down and got back up again, he started screaming like a girl and uh he ran and NP125 stabbed him once. I only seen him do it once and that's all." NP125 provided a similar version of events and outlined comments made towards MILICEVIC during his record of Police. interview with Detective Constable KIRKMAN asked NP125 , "And when did you first see this man?" NP125 replied, "Oh well I say I was sitting down on the seat and um he started walking and I was a bit agi that night. Cause like you know I'd been smoking pot. And um, I stress out pretty easily and he just started walking and um, and um he said something and I just, sort of retaliated and I called him a fag. And he said oh, that he wanted to kiss me and I just didn't like it mate, didn't like it at all. And I um punched him and um, he got up and um he started run for me and I stepped to the side of him and stabbed him in the shoulder.

 Comments and gestures can occur before, during and after the incident NP125 continued to explain his version of events when questioned further by Detective Constable KIRKMAN, who asked, "When you first saw this man, was he walking towards you or walking away from you?" NP125 stated,

Told him to get lost and he just wouldn't listen mate. Then he just started going

berserk" (ER-113).

"Towards me, near the seat. Cause I was sitting on a seat and the path is about from here to that wall away. And he sort of stepped off the path walking towards me." Detective straight KIRKMAN asked, "And what did you do?" NP125 stated, "Oh I just sat there mate and he just said, said, said something to me." Detective KIRKMAN asked, "What did he say?" | NP125 replied, "Oh I think it was something like you know, um cunts or something. I, I can't remember. But it isn't, wasn't pleasant. Mother of NP124 199 199 also provided a witness statement to Police in regards to homophobic comments made to her by her son. 199 stated, NP124 has a dislike towards homosexuals. He told me this a couple of weeks ago" (ST-583). It is unknown if LEPO made any bias related comments or gestures as she declined to be interviewed in relation to the incident, following legal advice. It appears as though MILICEVIC was unaware that he was in danger, as he most likely saw the group of offenders but chose to continue walking in their

Victims may not be aware of the significance of gestures made

It appears as though MILICEVIC was unaware that he was in danger, as he most likely saw the group of offenders but chose to continue walking in their general direction and allegedly approached the offenders, although this cannot be confirmed. The toxicology report taken from samples retrieved during the autopsy by Dr. BRADHURST show that MILICEVIC was not under the influence of alcohol, drugs or any other known illicit substances that may have impaired his judgement (OD-386).

Due to their young ages at the time of the murder, it is doubtful that any of them had tattoos. The tattoos which are displayed by NP124 and NP125 are known symbols of numerous OHG'S and white supremacist groups, who preach a hatred of homosexual males. The tattoo and tattoos depicted on NP124 are believed to stand for respectively. Whilst disturbing by nature, the exact meaning of the symbols is unclear and would require clarification from the offenders themselves.

The location of Rushcutters Bay Park was a known beat location. Detective Constable Steve KUHNKE interviewed. NP124 and asked him for his version of events, during his formal interview. NP124 said, "We were looking for someone to roll for some money up at the Cross. We decided to go to Rushcutters Bay because we knew it was a known homosexual gathering place." There were a number of other incidents that occurred in the same area, the most notable being the murder of Cyril OLSEN on the 22 August 1992. OLSEN was assaulted and bashed by unknown persons in Rushcutters Bay Park, prior to stumbling up to Rushcutters Bay Marina, where he fell into the water and subsequently drowned. OLSEN identified himself as a homosexual male and was thought to be frequenting the known beat location, with the intention of engaging in sexual acts with other males. 6. Victim/Witness Perception

Witnesses (actual) perceive that the incident was motivated by bias	Witness 1101 of Elizabeth Bay came forward to assist with identifying the offenders in the murder of MILICEVIC. 1101 told Police, "About 9.15pm on Sunday 15th August 1993, he heard a sound of pain coming from the centre of Rushcutters Bay Park. A short time later he saw three (3) young person's run west in the park towards Kings Cross" (OD-236). This information is contained in an investigation progress report completed by Rose Bay Detectives, as the completed witness statement of 1101 was not included in the available items that formed the brief of evidence. There are no indications that any actual witnesses perceived that this incident was motivated by bias. The Detectives that investigated the murder are clearly of the opinion that bias was a possible and strong motive. The Police opinion is based upon MILICEVIC'S suspected sexual orientation, the nature of the location as a beat and the admissions of the offenders themselves.

It is alleged that NP125 had in his possession the knife recovered from Rushcutters Bay and that the other young persons' knew this. GENERAL COMMENT	

No weapons of opportunity were used in the murder of MILICEVIC. NP125 armed himself with a knife prior to attending Rushcutters Bay Park, for the express purpose of committing a robbery. All offenders took part in the assault. The level of violence is excessive under the circumstances. The offenders outnumbering MILICEVIC three (3) to one (1), indicates that the use of the knife by NP125 even if it is to defend himself which is unlikely, is highly excessive.

Comment: John MILICEVIC, aged 46 years, was murdered at Rushcutters Bay Park, Rushcutters Bay on the 15 August 1993. Detective Senior Constable PAYNE who investigated the murder made the following comment in a progress report addressed to the Homicide Unit at Major Crime South Sydney, "The deceased is a single man who is employed with Westpac Bank, North Sydney. He resides on his own and is believed to be homosexual." There are no other background statements or information available to review regarding MILICEVIC'S sexuality, so the opinion of the Detectives who investigated the matter is relied upon when making this assessment. It is clear that there was a high level of animosity from NP125 and NP124 towards homosexual males. A statement provided by NP125 S support person, 1100 gave an insight into NP125 S attitude towards homosexual males. 1100 stated, "During one of the suspensions during the interview, Detective KIRKMAN left the interview room and I was again alone with the young person Mr NP125. He said: "I hate fags, my brother, well he's not my real brother, but I consider him to be my brother was attacked by fags." Both offenders NP124 and NP125 made numerous bias related comments in regards to MILICEVIC, as well as displaying a bias or phobia towards homosexual males in <u>general</u>. This attitude towards homosexual males is also represented in the comments made by co-offender NP124 in his interview with Detective Constable KUHNKE, when NP124 is asked to describe what happened on the night of MILICEVIC'S death. NP124 stated, "We were looking for someone to roll for some money up at the cross. We decided to go to Rushcutters Bay because we knew it was a known homosexual gathering place." Rushcutters Bay Park was a well known beat location. This was common knowledge and was certainly apparent to NP125 and NP124 No objects or items that represent the work of an OHG were left at the crime scene. NP125 threw the knife used to stab MILICEVIC into nearby Rushcutters Bay, which was subsequently recovered by Police Divers during the course of the investigation. This is believed to be the only exhibit retrieved from the scene. There are indications that a group of homeless teenagers or 'street kids' were targeting homosexual males in the area for robbery offences, NP125 commented about this in his interview with Detective Constable KUHNKE. Detective Constable KUHNKE said, "You're not aware of any pe, people hanging around there in particular?" NP125 replied, "I've heard some, I've heard of some um fag bashings that go on there. That's about it." Detective Constable KUHNKE said, "They happen at Rushcutters Bay, do they?" NP125 eplied, "Yeah, and at the wall." KUHNKE asked, "How do you know about those?" NP125 stated, "Just from the street kids and that you know, talking, and they say you know someone got, someone got bashed or something like that." NP125 and NP124 had not come under Police notice prior to the murder of MILICEVIC. NP126 has no other charges prior to or after the one that relates to the murder of MILICEVIC but has a lengthy history of interaction with Police in relation to mental health and self harm incidents. The primary motive for NP125 and NP124 appeared to be robbery/ for financial gain but there is evidence of this being bias related because they were actively targeting homosexual males as their preferred victims. NP125 NP124 and NP126 outnumbered MILICEVIC who was alone at the time, three to one with evidence suggesting all offenders took part in the assault. The level of violence was excessive under the circumstances. The use of the knife by NP125, even if it was to defend himself which is unlikely, is highly excessive. It is clear

from the attitude of the offenders, the offenders' admissions in relation to the location, and their choice of robbery
