A FORMER jockey was bashed to death in his unit on Sydney's north shore yesterday.

Late last night detectives were searching for a motive behind the murder of William Dutfield, 41, at Mosman. But police said they believed the murder was not linked to horse racing because the victim had not been a jockey of any note and had retired from the game while still in his youth.

Mr Dutfield was found face-down against a chair in the lounge room of his unit in Spit Rd, Mosman. Last night a post-mor-

The friend, a 75-year-old man who rented the apartment to the victim six months ago, discovered the murder.
