Phone clue to victim of bashing

A MAN found with severe head injuries as he wandered Sydney streets on Melbourne Cup night has died in hospital.

Police are now treating the case as a murder investigation and have appealed to the public for help.

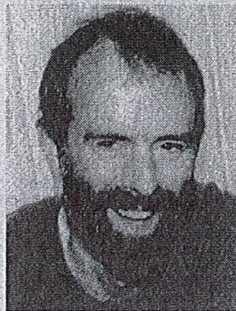
Train diver Carl Gregory Stockton, 52, of Surry Hills, was found by police at the intersection of Cleveland and Bourke Sts at Surry Hills, outside the Bar Cleveland, about 1.30am on Wednesday November 6 — the morning after the Cup.

He was taken to St Vincent's Hospital but died on Monday, drifting in and out of a coma on a life support machine.

A mobile phone owned by Mr Stockton may provide police with their only clue to his death.

So far there are no witnesses to the bashing, thought to have taken place between 11pm and 1.15am, and no apparent motive — his wallet and the phone were untouched.

Detectives have passed

the telephone to the police Crime Data Section to try to establish who Mr Stockton spoke to on the night of the assault.

Detective Senior Constable Neil Walker said yesterday: "The telephone could provide us with a breakthrough that could assist us, but we are still anxious to hear from anyone who may have seen Mr Stockton that evening."

They believe his presence would not have gone unnoticed — Mr Stockton, a regular in the bar, had his right arm in a sling because of a broken collarbone.

Staff from a nearby bar tended to him after

he was found on the roadside. He was taken to Sydney Hospital and later transferred to St Vincent's where he died on Monday afternoon.

Constable Walker said: "We believe the skull fractures were inflicted with a heavy, blunt instrument."

"All we have been able to ascertain is that he was at the Bar Cleveland during the afternoon on Melbourne Cup Day and may have left about 11pm that night.

"His movements between then and 1.15am remain unclear."

Mr Stockton worked since July 1990 as a train driver at the Enfield depot of Freight Corp having worked his way up through the grades.

Constable Walker added: "We are hoping that someone inside the bar may have seen what happened."

"At the moment we have no witnesses but hopefully someone would have seen him."
