Man 'found bleeding' on lavatory floor

A MAN told Newcastle Court yesterday that he found a bleeding man on the floor of a lavatory when he went to use the Birdwood Park facility nearly two years ago.

Brother Masseo, of the Order of the Society of St Francis, said he was looking around the park on December 19, 1980.

Brother Masseo, also known as Mr A.G. Clements, was giving evidence at a preliminary hearing, part-heard until today, of a charge accusing Jeffrey Miller, 22, prison inmate, of having murdered Richard Slater at Newcastle on December 19, 1980.

The court was told that Mr Slater, a 69-year-old pensioner, died in hospital three days later.

The regional forensic pathologist, Dr L. Banathy, attributed Mr Slater's death to traumatic brain damage and to a pre-existing heart condition. It was his opinion that the trauma caused a shock which precipitated myocardial infarction.
