There is nothing to suggest ROSE engaged in any activities that were out of the ordinary for a transgender aside from being more open about his appearance and taking less effort to mask the fact that he was biologically a male. He lived a relatively quiet and private life with his lifestyle unlikely to reflect negatively on the GLBTI Community. Other members of the public may have seen ROSE'S appearance as something out of the ordinary.
 Incident coincided with a holiday or date of particular significance to the victim or POI's group 	It is unknown if the date of ROSE'S death was anything significant to the offender. There is no evidence to suggest the date coincided with a significant date for ROSE either. There are no public holidays that fall on the 20 December. In the Record of Interview between Police and suspect, Sandra DURWARD, she stated that a mutual friend of hers and ROSE committed suicide around the same time as ROSE'S murder, a few years earlier. This does not appear to have any links to the death of ROSE however could be a significant date to ROSE or DURWARD given she was a suspect in the matter (ER-6).

ROSE worked a Monday to Friday role within the Westpac Bank as the lead analyst programmer for the action request system. On weekends ROSE would volunteer as a radio presenter on the radio station 2RPH (Radio for the Print Handicapped). ROSE wore female clothing to work both at the bank and the radio station. ROSE identified as a transgender. This in itself it quite often perceived by the public as breaking from the traditional conventions of day to day gender roles. No information is known about the offender as the murder of ROSE is currently unsolved. No motive was identified for the murder of ROSE. ROSE was well liked and respected. There was no evidence to suggest ROSE had received any recent threats or had any concerns about his safety. There was no evidence of forced entry suggesting that ROSE knew his assailant.

No clear economic or other motive for the incident exists	ROSE earned \$49,136 a year, had approximately \$45,000 deposited in various bank accounts, owned two units in the Eastern Suburbs, one on Anzac Parade, Kensington that he owned outright (later sold for \$150,000) and the unit he lived in, on Addison Street (later sold for \$255,000 with \$63,000 owing). ROSE also owned a motor vehicle worth about \$8,000 to \$10,000. ROSE had a will detailing that his belongings and wealth be shared between his mother, father and brother. ROSE'S brother, Ian, was identified as a person of interest due to the fact the he had reason to visit ROSE around the time of his murder. Ian ROSE was also aware of the difficulty his mother was having in coming to terms with the femininity of ROSE. It is possible ROSE and his brother discussed this issue with Ian asking ROSE to stop or tone down his	

	appearance. It is likely ROSE would not agree to this and in defence of the embarrassment caused to the family, lan struggled with ROSE subsequently causing his death. Whilst Ian ROSE was a beneficiary of part of the deceased's estate, it is unclear whether he was aware of this. It may have been a contributing factor in the motive behind ROSE'S death (ST-73). No other firm motive was identified during the investigation.

The investigation was unable to establish a firm motive for the murder of ROSE. ROSE was well liked and respected for his work commitments and personal attributes. There was an apparent lack of evidence of any forced entry into ROSE'S unit suggesting that he knew his assailant. ROSE was security conscious and would not have allowed strangers in to his unit. ROSE was financially stable with approximately \$45,000 deposited in various bank accounts, owned two units in the Eastern Suburbs, one on Anzac Parade Kensington that he owned outright (later sold for \$150,000) and the unit he lived in, on Addison Street (later sold for \$255,000 with \$63,000 owing). ROSE also owned a motor vehicle worth about \$8,000 to \$10,000. As there were no signs of break and enter, fraud or any other clear motivators, it cannot be ruled out that sexuality or other bias may have been involved in the death of ROSE.

GENERAL COMMENT

As no offender/s have been identified or charged in relation to the murder of ROSE, and no firm motive established, it is unclear what, if anything, was associated with or motivated with the murder of ROSE. ROSE suffered two fractures to his skull, accompanied by severe bruising. The head fractures were consistent with numerous heavy blows to the head with a blunt object ultimately proving fatal. There was no indication of sexual trauma. The level of violence displayed towards ROSE is substantial however there is no indication that the fatal assault on ROSE was pre-mediated.

SUMMARY OF FINDINGS

Indicator: Insufficient Information (II)

Comment: The murder of ROSE remains unsolved. A number of suspects were identified but no charges were laid. As such, the offender's sexual orientation or identity is unknown. ROSE was described as 'asexual' having no sexual attraction to either females or males. ROSE lived his life as transgender, dressing in women's clothes from the age of 18. ROSE had never had a sexual relationship with a male or female and from the early age of five or six had wanted to be female. No bias related drawings, markings, symbols or graffit were depicted in photographs reviewed of ROSE or the scene. There was an apparent lack of evidence of any forced entry into ROSE'S unit suggesting that he knew his assailant. As there were no signs of break and enter, fraud or any other clear motivators, it cannot be ruled that sexuality or other bias may have been involved in the death of ROSE.
