Woman 'must have killed'

Cross-dresser's inquest hears

A WOMAN who had access to the home of crossdressing Westpac computer expert David Rose told a workmate she "must have killed" him, an inquest into his death heard vesterday.

Mr Rose was bashed to death in his Kensington unit just before Christmas two years ago.

An inquest into his death was told vesterday that a "security conscious" Mr Rose was probably killed by someone he knew, with his killer locking the door from the outside.

Mr Rose's close friend Sandra Durward faced three hours of questions at Glebe Coroners Court about her movements on the weekend of his death.

The court was told Ms Durward was often given a spare set of keys to Mr Rose's unit, had bruises on her face after his death and told her co-workers that she

"must have killed" him.

In his full-time work, Mr Rose worked as a computer specialist in telephone banking with Westpac.

The court heard Mr Rose took Ms Durward into his home whenever she had fallen out with her friends due to her alcoholism.

She denied telling co-Ms Durward is relying on workers that she had killed league after Mr Rose's funeral that a "hideous realisation has struck me, it's quite nasty and quite serious".

"I must have killed that guy. Didn't you see it on television. The cross-dresser. I couldn't have done it, he's my best friend," she told Ms Hudson.

Ms Durward yesterday put these comments down to stress and a highly inappropriate sense of humour".

Magistrate and acting State Coroner John Abernethy called for police to search for Mr Thwaites, and adjourned the hearing until November 17.
