	1. About 12 midday on Tuesday the 30 April, 1985,
	1230 , who, at the time was a 'Drag
	Queen', called at Darlinghurst Rd, Darlinghurst
	to see a transexual prostitute, named Wendy WAYNE, whose
	real name is Wayne Kerry BRENNAN, born 26 July, 1949.
	2. 1230 attended those premises at the request of
	Patrick Lakey CROWE, an associate of BRENNAN who had
	not seen or heard from BRENNAN since the Sunday prior,
	28 April, 1985. In fact, 1230 received this request
	by phone from CROWE who was at the time the manager of
	'Pete's Beat', a homosexual discotheque in Oxford Street.
	In essence, CROWE said to 1230 , 'That's funny because
	I haven't heard from her since Sunday and she normally
	rings me every day'. 1230 said, 'Do you want me to
	go around and check to see if she is at home?' CROWE
	replied, 'Yes'.
	3. When 1230 arrived, he pressed the doorbell
	and noticed the door was opened approximately ten inches.
	He pushed it further open and called out, 'Wendy'. He
	observed the television and heater were on, and on entering
	the apartment, being a ground floor unit, went to the
	doorway into the bedroom where he observed BRENNAN's bed
	was in an untidy condition and pillows were on the floor.
	1230 contacted CROW from that flat, and was asked to
	wait there until BRENNAN came home. 1230 waited for
	approximately a minute and then walked back into the
	bedroom from the loungeroom with the feeling that something
	might be wrong, where on doing so, discovered BRENNAN
	lying face down on the other side of the bed. He noticed
	blood on the body and immediately contacted CROWE and told him of the discovery. [230] waited outside the apartment

for approximately fifteen minutes for Patrick CROWE. On arrival, CROWE who was with Stephen Ross CRICH, entered the flat with |230 | and the three viewed the body. CRICH arranged for Police attendance through his accountant, Josephine CAIN. A short time later, Police arrived. Constables COLES and AUSTIN of Darlinghurst Police were first to attend and on entering the apartment, likewise noticed the television and heater were on. On entering the bedroom, they saw a blood soaked pillow partially covered by a bedspread in the centre of the bed. The deceased was lying, naked, faced down on the floor beside the bed near the southern wall. A large calibre bullet wound was situated between the shoulder blades and also a wound to the left hand. There were two pools of blood in front of the body, one just above the left hand. The second pool had a blood smear leading to where the head was situated. This commenced on the bed. CROWE identified the body to Constables COLE and AUSTIN as that of Wendy Wayne BRENNAN, however, identification was positively confirmed by fingerprint comparison by Senior Constable BULLIVANT, at the City mortuary, as that of Wayne Kerry BRENNAN. A copy of his criminal record has been obtained and PRODUCED.

4. A full post mortem examination was conducted by Doctor OETTLE, commencing 7.40pm on 30 April, 1985, at the City Morgue. Detective Senior Constable SANDEMAN of the Ballistics Section was present. In fact this Detective attended the relevant apartment earlier that day, and took a number of photographs of the crime scene. I PRODUCE THOSE PHOTOGRAPHS.

5. It was noted that the following injuries had been sustained by BRENNAN, those injuries being;

- One bullet entry wound at the back of the neck, exiting at the front of the neck.
- 2. A bullet entry wound at the base of the

skull exiting at the chin.

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- 3. An entry and exit wound on the left hand of the deceased, which is consistent with it having been in line with the trajectory of either projectile.
- 4. An 18mm. by 40 mm. bruise of the left side of the back of the skull. It was noted that the force of this blow would have been sufficient to render the victim unconscious.
- 5. Slight bruising was also evident to the left upper arm and a small laceration was detected which is consistent with being caused by a fingernail. Bruising was also noted under the victims chin,

The cause of death was the bullet wound to the back.

6. Initial inquiries revolved around Brennan's associates as it was established from CROWE that she often worked as a female impersonator, entertaining primarily the gay community at an Oxford Street night club. Apart from this she worked as a transexual prostitute in the Darlinghurst area and in particular 'Premier Lane'. [225], a transexual prostitute also worked in Premier Lane on Sunday night the 28th April, 1985, while working she saw the deceased working. She last saw her in that area about 2am on 29th April. It was a fact that while working as a prostitute BRENNAN would take her clients to her apartment where in fact she was murdered.

7. **1227** who was also working that same night in Premier Lane, informed Police that she last saw the deceased about 3.15am on Monday morning the 29 April. **1227** was firstly propositioned by a male described as 22 to 26 years old, with a tattoo on his left hand and after informing him that she didn't have a car, directed him to the deceased. He approached BRENNAN and after a short discussion they walked from Premier Lane towards BRENNAN's home. That was the last time **1227** saw BRENNAN.

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> attended a flat in that same block, on Monday night about 6pm and on leaving about 7.45pm, they observed a female sitting outside the front of flat Darlinghurst Road. She fitted exactly the description of the deceased, therefore little value could be given to this line of investigation. At this stage this male has not been identified.

It now appears, if accepting McCARTHY's sighting of a 9. female outside the front of the murdered victim's flat, as that of the deceased, combined with the knowledge that , a friend of the deceased found BRENNAN's front 1242 door open and the interior light on at 9pm that same night, therefore it is possible BRENNAN met her demise during this period of time. This is further supported by |230 , who, on attending th e flat found the front door open and the interior light on.

Inquiries were conducted at 'Pete's Beat' but nothing 10. came to fruition. Inquiries were also directed at her associates and they too were of little assistance in identifying the killer. It did come to light however, that Brennan spoke to a number of them about her association with a Policeman named 'David'. 1223 1223 and Laurie BRADFORD both met David. In fact BRADFORD states she saw a Police Shirt with one stripe on the sleeve. Therefore in light of the fact that the killer had some awareness ob ballistic evidentiary value, emphasis was placed on trying to identify this person. Eventually, 1233, 48 year old prostitute was interviewed and she identified a 1st Class Constable from photographs, as being the officer whom BRENNAN had been seeing. She added that she saw him working the Local Police truck in Darlinghurst Road, Kings Cross shortly after meeting him. That Constable was questioned and it established that he has never been attached to Darlinghurst Police nor has he been in any Police truck in the area. Therefore it is felt that this line of enquiry has 🖢 been exhausted.

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> 11. Extensive media coverage was given to the murder and consequently a number of lines of information were received. These enquiries have extended to other states of Australia, however, nothing of any constructive value has come to light. It is fair to say that at this stage, there is no singular concerted line of investigation.

> 12. Prior tennants were considered in the enquiry and it was established that NP181 , had previously lived there. She figured prominently in an involved drug dealing trial as a vital witness for the Crown but failed to supply the Court with the necessary evidence elicited by Police respecting the accused. It was felt at the time there may have been some connection in so far as a reprisal but after examination of a number of facts, that is to say, herehereabouts were widely known and also the murder did not happen until approximately six months after the subject court case, coupled with the fact that NP181 does not look like the deceased, little emphasis was placed on this line apart from interviewing NP181 in connection with it. When interviewed NP181 commented that if she was the intended victim, there would have been no likelihood of the killer confusing her with BRENNAN.

> 13. In summary, there is no information forthcoming to suggest that the deceased was involved in any illegal activity. She is not an associate of the criminal element. It is generally felt by investigating officers that should this comment had been to the contrary, her associates would have supplied Police necessary information from the outset.
