- Q. Now you have expressed three manners in which you believe that the Deceased may have died?

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- A. Correct.
- Q. And that's based on your examination of the Deceased at the scene?

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- A. Yes.
- Q. Is that correct. And also of your examination and other examinations that were undertaken as a result of your autopsy?

  A. Yes.

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Q. And is there any, the manner in which the person died, is there one manner more likely that is consistent with the injuries?

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A. My understanding is that there is no evidence at all of the Deceased having been on top of the cliff face.

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CORONER: That is correct.

WITNESS: If that's the case the Deceased could not have fallen from the cliff face or from the top of the cliff face and it sounds unlikely to me that he in fact started climbing the cliff face as an alternative. In that case the Deceased would more likely than not have been killed in a homicidal fashion. The, I suppose the only major reason why a fall from the cliff face was a possibility was the fact that he was found at the bottom of a cliff face. If he had been found anywhere else I would have been prepared to say that homicide was by far the most likely manner of death.

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CORONER: Have you got the photos there?

PROTHERO: Yes sir.

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CORONER: Q. Have a look at the photo of Scott in situ and particularly the way the body is lying. Is that a common, is that the way you'd expect to see him stretched out neatly like that after a fall from that height? Or would it be more likely to be more crumpled in the rag-doll fashion?

A. I have to admit that I haven't been to that many scenes of--

Q. Falls? Aaccident or suicide or other falls. I've been to a number of them. And they haven't appeared like this. But the number that I've been to have not been enough unfortunately	5
PROTHERO: Q. The injuries, just looking at the placement of the body, are the injuries consistent with the placement of the body? (No verbal reply).	10
CORONER: With a placement of the body?	
PROTHERO: Q. Or that being the final resting place or the scene of the fall, if it was a fall?  A. The Deceased may have moved even a small amount following the fall in which case the position that he was in could be feasible. If he had not moved at all, no I don't	15
think so. There were injuries to the neck for instance, to the front of the neck which would not be expected in a fall with him lying in this position. The wrist injuries as well I don't think would be entirely consistent with him being in that position.	20
CORONER: Q. You say in your report too that the head and abdominal injuries are somewhat atypical of a fall from a height?	25
A. Yes they are. The head injury itself was more consistent with a blow more in the midline, a transverse blow as well as more a vertical blow to the neck itself. The abdominal injuries are unusual in that there were no associated rib fractures or pelvic fractures, yet there were quite significant abdominal injuries. You'd expect if he fell onto a flat surface in any case that to have abdominal	30
injuries you'd have to have injuries on either side and there were none.	35
Q. Once again lending support to the, to some sort of homicidal attack? A. Yes.	40
Q. Either there or the body being placed there afterwards? A. Yes.	
CORONER: Have you any questions you want to ask Dr Duflou?	45
Q. Of course the blood alcohol level was very high? A. Yes it was 0.220.	
Q. And that alone mitigates against him somehow climbing over that fence you saw and falling doesn't it?  A. Well in terms of requiring the motor skills to climb	50
that fence, yes. On the other hand, falling, if he had been able to get over the fence with a blood alcohol like that it would have been very easy.	55

A. My full name is Lyle William Van Leeuwen, Van Leeuwen is spelt Van Leeuwen, I'm a Detective Senior Constable of Police attached to the East Sydney Crime Scene Section, working from the Sydney Police Centre in Surry Hills.	10
Q. Constable you have prepared a statement in relation to the death of Scott Miller? A. Yes ma'am I have.	15
Q. That is your statement? A. Yes ma'am that's my statement.	13
Q. Does your signature appear at the bottom of each page? A. Yes it does.	20
Q. And that's true and correct? A. To the best of my knowledge it is, yes.	
Q. And you also prepared a number of photographs, is that correct? A. Yes I have.	25

Q. And how long have you been a crime scene officer? A. I've been a crime scene examiner for the last ten years working in both city and country crime scene sections throughout New South Wales.	40
Q. And as part of your duties you examine scenes of both homicides and falls, is that correct? A. Yes I do, yes.	40
Q. And can you give an approximate number of scenes that you would have examined A. Yes.	45
Qinvolving falls and homicides?  A. I've examined over thirty homicide scenes in my ten years as a crime scene examiner and I have examined close to fifty scenes of suspicious deaths, either involving falls or where a fall has formed part of the death - for arguments'	50
sake people, you know, who have stumbled and fallen over a fence and then over a cliff which was a possibility in this case; but where people have also fallen from buildings, fallen from scaffoldings and the like so I've got a fair bit of experience in relation to examining falls.	55

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- Q. And you've also undertaken a number of courses with your duties?
- A. Yes ma'am.
- Q. And that day you examined the scene and surrounds, is that correct?
- A. Yes we did.
- Q. And you actually made a particularly thorough examination of the vegetation above where the Deceased was 10 found?
- A. Yes I did.
- Q. And as a result of your examination of the vegetation were you able to say whether a person had been through that 15 vegetation recently?

A. The vegetation at the top of the cliff being on the Munns(?) Reserve side of the fence which was the public area of the fence was a lot of dead leaf matter and decaying leaf and timber matter and it actually doesn't tend to yield any evidence whether there has been people through there. But the vegetation on the outside of the fence which was the Darling Harbour side of the fence was green ivy and green ivy tends to break fairly easy and tends to leave definite imprint marks, not detailed marks but definite imprint marks in the vegetation and we cut a hole in the fence in an area where there was no ivy and slowly progressed our way along the side of the cliff face and we didn't find any indentation marks there that would suggest that somebody had

either walked, stumbled, fallen or rolled through that ivy.

CORONER: Q. You were also actually looking for broken stalks too weren't you?

A. Yes your Worship I went through actually looking for broken stems of the ivy-
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- Q. And found nothing?
- A. And just didn't find anything.

1.1 metres where Scott was lying.

- Q. And did you form the opinion as to whether a person could have gone from the top of the fence and over the cliff face without touching the ivy?

  A. It is possible to do that. The cliff face from the top of the fence extends out a distance of no more than 1.8 metres at any given point along that cliff area and it would be quite easy to fall and not hit or touch the ivy or the rocks on the way down, especially if you were in an intoxicated state. But for that to happen you would have ended up a lot further away from the cliff face than the
- Q. And that's based on your expertise?
  A. That's based on the expertise and little bit of physics calculations.
- Q. And with the ivy, when you examined the scene as in one of the photographs two leaves of ivy near the feet of the deceased, and can you explain that?
- A. I didn't place any weight on that ivy in the fact that

it had been raining, it had been very windy and you will get naturally ivy just you know leaves and that moving around the area and there was only two leaves. If Scott had gone over and gone through that ivy I would have expected there to be a significantly large number of leaves down the bottom. Even not just close to him, in the area of that machinery yard and there wasn't.	5
Q. And wasn't(?) inconsistent with the rest of the area in the, that he was found? A. Well in, that would be right, yes.	10
Q. Is there anything further - I withdraw that. The blood on the back of the T-shirt, has that been retained?  A. The T-shirt has been retained for grouping purposes when and if we can get a cross-comparison sample.	15
Q. And that would be a cross-comparison with some other person other than Scott? A. That's usually the case, yes.	20
Q. And that would normally be what would be referred to as the suspect? A. Yes.	0.5
Q. And is there anything further that you believe that could be done to assist the Coroner in his inquiry today?  A. I think we've definitely really exhausted our means of inquiry in relation to the forensic side of this brief Sergeant, we've really put some effort into this one.	30
CORONER: Q. But your bottom line is you have little doubt this is a homicide?  A. From the moment I saw the position Scott was in your Worship it just didn't sit right with me. In a lot of cases we go to these scenes and the police give us information and we can immediately piece together, in this one it wasn't the	35
case. The police didn't have the information to give us. But the position he was located, and the position which he could have come from just didn't gel and as such I got other forensic experts out to that scene which - I treated the scene as a homicide.	40
Q. And one of the factors which go towards a homicide of course are the, as you mention in your statement, the presence of blood stains at the back of his T-shirt?  A. Yes your Worship I can't explain how those blood stains would have got there based on the position that Scott was	45
lying in. There's many suppositions of why they could have been there, one of those being that he'd been assaulted in another place, laid down in the back of a vehicle or in the back of a station wagon or something and been bleeding onto his back. But in the position he was laid down in and even	50
given Doctor Duflou's evidence that may well have moved I don't believe that he would have rolled onto his back.  It's, the blood staining on the back of the T-shirt would have been the most crucial piece of forensic evidence that got me to treat this as a homicide, not a fall.	55

#### <WITNESS RETIRED AND EXCUSED

PROTHERO: Sir I note that Paul Reilly the ambulance officer was to be called as a witness. I have called his name in court and I've just had the detective go outside and call his name--

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CORONER: I don't think it takes it any further.

PROTHERO: No neither do I sir. No, Mr Miller agrees. That's the evidence sir.

5 CORONER: I think there are some matters now that the police are looking at further. I don't expect any magic in that but it's, in view of the finding I am going to bring in I think it's important that they do go as far as they can with 10 the employees of Patrick Stevedore. But I have sufficient evidence before me to bring in a finding as to how he died but not as to the precise manner of his death or who was involved in his death, it's what we call an "open finding". It's unfortunate. This whole case is unfortunate because 15 the only evidence I really have is the forensic evidence which is in two parts, the evidence of Doctor Duflou which really does tie in with the crime scene evidence of Detective Constable Van Leeuwen and Detective Senior Sergeant Cameron. 20

But very briefly - Scott resided at Orange prior to his death and he moved to Sydney, as I understand it, to commence university. The issues in this case for me are twofold - first of all whether, I have got to be satisfied as to whether or not this death was a homicide and if so who might have committed it. I have looked carefully at the brief, I can answer the first question but not the second. The case officer, Sergeant Del Vecchio, is not here today and I have had quite regular contact with Scott's father. We have also been in close contact with Detective Senior Constable Van Leeuwen and the officer-in-charge of the case Detective Senior Constable Lane. We have visited the location where Scott's body was found. As I say because of the lack of other evidence it has been most important to get to first base, that is to determine from this forensic evidence I have whether Scott's death was a homicide or an accident or indeed a suicide. To this end I, as I say, I arranged for a review of Detective Senior Constable Van Leeuwen's evidence and that was done by Detective Senior Sergeant Cameron who has had enormous experience in matters relating to physical evidence or crime scene as we call it.

I also arranged for a review of Doctor Duflou's work to be done by Professor Hilton. He is out of the country at the moment but he has had a look at it and he can take Doctor Duflou's work no further.

Very briefly, Scott had a night out with his friends on the night of the Gay Mardi Gras, 1 March. He was last seen by his friend, Shawn Kelly, near the Orient Hotel at about half past one or quarter to two, he was pretty drunk. He was later seen by Jade Carter who is a local and knows the area very well, as she was walking home from the area of Sydney Observatory. She gave an excellent description of Scott and the clothes he was wearing. Mr Kelly estimates as I say that he saw Scott at about 1.30 to quarter to two on 2 March and Jade believed she saw him at about quarter past two or ten past two.

He was found at the base of a cliff in the compound of Patrick Stevedore, gate five, wharf four, Darling Harbour, and he was found on the 3 March, the Monday. He was found on asphalt at the base of that cliff.

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Detective Lane the investigator first felt that he'd fallen from the cliff. I think he concedes, he certainly conceded to me when I spoke to him that there are a number of factors that mitigate against that. Firstly at the top of the cliff is a hire wire fence. Secondly Scott was very drunk with a blood alcohol level of 0.22. Thirdly, crime scene officers very, very carefully examined the ledge above the cliff which was covered in an ivy type of plant. They found absolutely no signs of footprint disturbance in that They also found no broken stalks or anything whilst that. Whilst Detective Van Leeuwen says that he may have jumped in effect from the fence straight over he would have expected him to have been a further distance out from the base of the cliff than he was. Fourthly Scott's body was in effect laid out straight which was somewhat unusual in a Normally bodies are more cramped up, fall situation. contorted. Fifthly, his injuries I feel and I think Constable Van Leeuwen and Doctor Duflou feel are in the main far more consistent with an assault than injuries sustained in a fall. You will recall Doctor Duflou's evidence for example relating to the abdominal injuries and facial injuries.

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Now Doctor Duflou of course still believes could possibly have caused the death or a push. He feels, quite clearly, that that is less likely than an assault, either there or an assault elsewhere and he has been placed there either dead or alive. It is unfortunate there is no further evidence. A canvass has been most of most of the staff of Patricks and the investigators will concede after my finding that they really have to go through everyone who was there that night simply to make sure that no-one saw him. Because the mystery in this case is how did he get into the compound Maybe the night if there is a night watchman on duty? watchman was off duty or had gone away for minutes, who knows? But that's not clear. The whole purpose of the night watchman or gatekeeper is to stop unauthorised people But that evidence or those inquiries going into that area. will not barr me bringing in a finding today and as my finding will be that of a homicide the matter will remain It is imperative that the staff on duty open for all time. be interviewed carefully even, as I say, to negate the possibility that someone saw him.

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This is the type of matter where investigators may again be helped by a programme like, "Australia's Most Wanted" or a press article - as usual in these matters the press are not here, they turn up for sensational matters but they do not bother with common garden-variety murders but to the family of Scott Miller this is an horrific event. It may be that the press or the electronic media may be able to assist further if we can get them interested.

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I HAVE NO EVIDENCE AS JUST HOW SCOTT CAME TO BE AT THE PLACE HE WAS FOUND. I ACCORDINGLY FIND THAT SCOTT STUART MILLER DIED ON 2 MARCH 1997 AT, AND I MUST SAY AT SYDNEY, I CANNOT PUT IT ANY HIGHER THAN THAT, OF MULTIPLE INJURIES INFLICTED BY A PERSON OR PERSONS UNKNOWN. AS TO THE PERSON OR PERSON WHO INFLICTED THE INJURIES AND THE MANNER IN WHICH SUCH INJURIES WERE INFLICTED THE EVIDENCE EDUCED DOES NOT ENABLE ME TO - OR THE PRECISE MANNER IN WHICH SUCH INJURIES WERE INFLICTED, THE EVIDENCE EDUCED DOES NOT ENABLE ME TO SAY.

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I thank everyone for their attendance today. To Mr and Mrs Miller and Scott's family I, you have my sympathies. I hope the day I become inured to homicide I will have the presence of mind to give the game away.

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
