Brief Description:	On 14/02/2019 DSC CLANCY sent an email to #FSGRMTNCIDD for an Interpol Request, E903927 relates.
	The email read:
	"I am the Officer in Charge of Strike Force Skarratt, the re-investigation into the murder of
	Kenneth BRENNAN at Elizabeth Bay between 10-12 June 1995, E903927 relates.
	The deceased, Kenneth BRENNAN (DOB: 06/10/1941) was located inside his unit,
	Onslow Ave, Elizabeth Bay at 5.30pm 12/06/1995. He died as a result of multiple stab
	wounds to his chest. The crime scene was examined by fingerprint and physical evidence
	personnel with a number of exhibits being seized. A very comprehensive investigation into the homicide by detectives from Kings Cross and
	Major Crime - Homicide Squad was conducted at the time. During the investigation
	extensive enquiries and the elimination of numerous persons of interest were made with
	investigators being unable to link any person to the offence.
	A forensic review was conducted on 07/03/2016 where a number of exhibits seized from the
	crime scene were identified to be forensically tested, with some exhibits to be retested.
	On 24/02/2017, Dr FRIEDMAN from Forensic and Analytical Science Service notified
	investigators a full DNA profile, of an unknown male, had been developed from a pair of
	underpants and a condom located at the crime scene. This DNA profile has been used to
	search against DNA samples held on the National Criminal Investigation DNA Database
	(NCIDD) with nil success.
	BRENNAN was a homosexual male, who was promiscuous in his sexual behaviour. He had
	previously advertised for sexual encounters in the local gay newspapers and would bring
	home various partners. It has been recorded he had a preference for Asian males.
	I am of the opinion that the unidentified DNA profile located on the underwear and on the
	condom, is not necessarily the offender, however would assist to identify who the offender
	may be and to solve this investigation. Therefore further efforts should be made world-wide
	to identify the unidentified DNA profile."
