

| | <p><u>POST MORTEM EXAMINATION OF THE DECEASED.</u></p> | <p>JOHNSTON REITH.</p> |
| | <p>The post mortem examination of the deceased was carried out by Doctor BRIGHTON.</p> | |
| | <p>There were approximately 53 stab wounds to the body of the deceased, excluding, a massive wound measuring 14 cms x 10 cms to the left chest of the deceased.</p> | |
| | <p>The stab wounds were inflicted to the left side of the back in the vicinity of the shoulder blade; the underside of the left arm; the right chest and stomach areas.</p> | |
| | <p>The massive wound to the left side of the chest had been caused by repeated blows with the knife whilst the deceased had been on his back. The direction of these "blows" was from the head to the feet. The repeated blows and hacking from the knife had severed two of the deceased's ribs, close to the breastbone, and had caused them to "fold over". There were numerous wounds to the left lung, which had collapsed. Whilst there were these numerous wounds to the vicinity of the heart, only one had pierced the heart but had not pierced the pericardium.</p> | |
| | <p>There was a severe laceration, 10 cms long to the throat, however, no artery or vital organ was severed. This laceration was beveled up and there was a superficial cut leading upwards from this wound.</p> | |
| | <p>Internal organs that had stab wounds included the heart, left lung (numerous), right lung, spleen, liver, two small wounds to the top of the stomach.</p> | |
| | <p>Doctor Brighton was of the opinion, that the deceased suffered the wounds to the back and left arm area whilst in a standing position. Of these wounds, 25 penetrated the rib cage area whilst others undercut the skin and fat and travelled obliquely to the skin of the deceased. After receiving these wounds the deceased apparently fell to the ground. There was a small hematoma to the back of the scalp with an associated bruising to the front part of the brain, indicative of him falling on his back and hitting his head.</p> | <p>Continued.</p> |

| | <p>Doctor Brighton stated that the massive wound to the left chest area, the slashing of the throat, and the two wounds to the front thoracic area (including the wound in which the knife was found), were all POST MORTEM (after death) wounds, and no doubt would all have been caused whilst the deceased was lying supine as found.</p> | |
| | <p>Doctor Brighton viewed the knife and stated that the wounds all had the classic characteristic sharp and blunt edges consistent with the exhibit knife. The length of most of the wounds that penetrated the rib cage varied between 7 cms and 9 cms. The blade of the knife is 13 cms., however, when a body is stabbed, the body compresses and does not give a true indication of the length of blade.</p> | |
| | <p>Doctor Brighton stated that the stab wounds are consistent with having been inflicted by the exhibit knife.</p> | |
| | <p>There were no other obvious marks of violence on the body of the deceased.</p> | |
| | <p>Doctor Brighton stated that the cause of death was haemorrhage haemorrhage and respiratory failure due to multiple stab wounds.</p> | |
| | <p>There was no evidence of the deceased having consumed a large meal shortly prior to his death.</p> | |

Arrived at the scene at 9.00 a.m., the deceased was found lying on its back on the top landing of the Grand Stand overlooking the park. The body was fully dressed in black shoes, fawn socks, fawn trousers, a belt, white under-pants, yellow 'T' shirt, blue shirt, red jumper, grey cardigan. Watch on left wrist 'Felea' brand, coins to the total of \$2.26, and a handkerchief were located in the right hand trouser pocket. Two coloured photographs of a dog were found in the shirt pocket of the deceased.</p> | |
| | <p>2. The deceased was lying on its back, both legs fully extended with the right foot against the rear wall of that stand. The right arm was extended from the body with the hand resting against the same wall. The left arm, bent at the elbow, away from the body, with the hand and wrist protruding over the step of that particular landing. The head and shoulders of the deceased were lying in the aisle between the seats. There was a large amount of blood around the feet of the deceased, and around the shoulder and chest area. There was a continuous stream of blood running down the entire sixteen (16) steps of that stand. There were blood smears to the height of 3'6" on the wall directly above the right foot of the deceased. There was a bone handled knife embedded in the right side of the deceased's chest.</p> | |

| | <p>About 9.30am on 28-9-76, a Drummoyne Council employee, Ronald William BRADEY, of [REDACTED] Five Dock, [REDACTED] was cleaning out the bandstand in Five Dock Park, when he located one Resch's empty stubby beer bottle and a quantity of broken glass apparently from similar type bottles, on the floor of that building.</p> <p>It would appear that vagrant types have been using the bandstand during the hours of darkness and the bottle mentioned above may have been left in the bandstand by one of these types. The bandstand mentioned is in the vicinity of the grandstand where the body of the deceased was found.</p> <p>The bottle and pieces of glass were conveyed to the fingerprint section where they were examined by Sgt. McKellar. A fingerprint was found on the stubby bottle which is identifiable but not suitable for Court proceedings. No prints were found on the pieces of glass. | | <p>The flood lights in front of the stand are only used on football training nights and have not been used for about three weeks, in any case they are set to switch off automatically at 8.45pm each night, when they were in use.</p> | |
| | <p>Bamford alleged that he has known the deceased, Jones, for the time that he has been employed on the council, about six, years. He also knew the father of the deceased, who he stated died about 12 months ago.</p> | |

He has known the deceased for a period of approximately 11 years. He has worked on the same gangs as the deceased on numerous occasions. He stated that he knew that the deceased used to drink a lot and bet frequently. He stated he had not heard of the deceased ever carrying a knife and did not know any person who would have harmed him. HATFIELD is employed as a foreman in the food packaging section of Maggie-Nestles (Phone 713-9321) Great North Road, Abbotsford. He stated that he has a nephew named, [REDACTED] NP247 born [REDACTED] 35, who resides alone at [REDACTED] Abbotsford. This house in fact was left to [REDACTED] NP247 in HATFIELD'S mother will. He regards [REDACTED] NP247 as a suspect in JONES murder for the following reasons:-</p> <p>He stated that [REDACTED] NP247 confessed to HATFIELD'S wife some time ago that he was a 'homosexual'. He told her that whilst he was in Vancouver, Canada he had a relationship with a chinese man and stated 'the things he did to me you wouldn't believe'. He also stated that whilst in a state of depression he cut his wrists and throat, attempting suicide and was consequently admitted to a psychiatric hospital. [REDACTED] NP247 returned to Australia about 2½ years ago. Since then has been unemployed, living on social service benefits.</p> <p>[REDACTED] NP247 bears hatred towards HATFIELD'S uncle, John Kelton PHILLIPS, 78 old, presently in care of the 'Parkview' Convalescent Hospital, Park Road, Fivedock. This came about as a result of him over-hearing PHILLIPS some years ago calling him a 'poofter' whilst he appeared to be asleep. Prior to PHILLIPS being admitted to the convalescent hospital, he was living with [REDACTED] NP247 in [REDACTED] Abbotsford, together with HATFIELD and his wife.</p> <p>HATFIELD further stated that in August, 1976, an argument developed at the Abbotsford address between [REDACTED] NP247 and PHILLIPS which resulted in [REDACTED] NP247 threatening him with a sword and saying 'I'll kill the bastard, I'll kill him'. He can't elaborate further on the reasons the fight or argument started. HATFIELD stated that at the time he knew [REDACTED] NP247 to have a 'Japanese sword' and a bayonet</p> | |
