Special Commission of Inquiry into LGBTIQ hate crimes

I refer to the above Inquiry, and to my letter of 3 May 2023 advising that the Inquiry proposes to hold a public hearing dealing with changes to NSW Police Force ("NSWPF") investigative practices and procedures.

Investigative Practices Hearing: Request for further statement

The NSWPF has advised, in response to summonses to produce, that exhibits in several cases the subject of the Inquiry have been lost or destroyed. The Inquiry has been assisted by statements in specific cases from DS Neil Sheldon (statements dated 21 December 2022, 18 January 2023, 19 January 2023, 23 January 2023, 17 April 2023 and 5 May 2023) and DS Nigel Warren (21 February 2023, 29 March 2023, 30 March 2023, 5 May 2023).

Attached to this letter is a schedule identifying the cases where the Inquiry has summonsed exhibits and received a response that some or all of those exhibits have not been able to be located and/or have been destroyed ("Exhibits Schedule"). Where relevant, the Exhibits Schedule identifies the response received from the NSWPF in relation to those exhibits.

In anticipation of the Investigative Practices Hearing, the Inquiry would be assisted by a statement from an appropriate officer of the NSWPF, who is available to give evidence at the public hearing on **20 June 2023**, addressing the matters detailed below.

This statement is sought to assist in identifying those matters which will be explored at the Investigative Practices Hearing. In addition, it is intended to provide the NSWPF with the opportunity to respond with particularity to some of the matters of concern to the Inquiry.

Matters to be addressed

The requested statement should address the following matters, having regard to the specific cases identified in the Exhibits Schedule. The phrase "act or omission" refers to conduct by the NSWPF or a member of the NSWPF that led to the loss or destruction of the relevant exhibits.

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Please identify:

- (1) Which NSWPF exhibit management policies and procedures were in operation at the time of the investigation when the act or omission occurred;
- (2) Whether the act or omission was consistent or inconsistent with the applicable policies and procedures identified at (1) at the time of the investigation. If inconsistent, please identify which policies or procedures the act or omission was inconsistent with;
- (3) Whether the NSWPF is of the view that the act or omission was consistent or inconsistent with proper police practice as it was understood at the time of the investigation. If inconsistent, please explain how it was inconsistent;
- (4) Whether the NSWPF is of the view that the act or omission was consistent or inconsistent with proper police practice as it is understood today. If inconsistent, please explain how the act or omission is inconsistent. If your answer differs to (3), please explain how proper police practice has changed since the time of the act or omission;
- (5) Any NSWPF policies, procedures or practices that have changed since the time of the investigation to avoid or reduce the risk of a similar act or omission occurring in a current investigation.

For the avoidance of doubt, if it is not clear when or how an exhibit came to be lost or destroyed, or who was directly responsible for the act or omission that led to the loss or destruction, it is expected that the statement will nonetheless address the matters identified at (1)-(5) to the best of the deponent's knowledge having made reasonable inquiries.

Where the officer refers to a NSWPF policy, procedure, guideline or chapter of the NSWPF Handbook, a copy of the relevant document (historical and current) should be annexed to the statement.

Non-publication orders

It is anticipated that the Inquiry will tender the requested statement in evidence in a public hearing and that the statement will be uploaded to the Inquiry's website.

In the event that the Commissioner of the NSWPF seeks any non-publication orders in relation to the statement and/or any annexures, a schedule of the proposed orders sought should be provided to the Inquiry at the same time as the signed statement, for consideration by Senior Counsel Assisting.

Timeframe for provision of the statement

Please provide the Inquiry with the requested statement and any schedule of non-publication orders sought by no later than **5pm on 1 June 2023.**

In the event that you anticipate any difficulty with the above timeframe for the provision of the statement, please forward a request for an extension of time in writing as soon as possible. To assist in considering the application for an extension, please provide a brief outline of the reasons an extension is sought and the date by which you anticipate being in a position to produce the material sought.

On 7 October 2022, the NSWPF advised that two exhibits could not be located, namely:

- Health Care and Frequent Flyer cards belonging to Crispin Dye; and
- Items from Crispin Dye's wallet and items belonging to Michael Belston.

By letter dated 23 March 2023, the Inquiry requested that the NSWPF locate what was described as "pieces of paper found on body of C Dye", a photocopy of which was apparently annexed to a statement of Detective Sergeant Roy Knight. According to a table of contents in respect of the coronial brief (c. August 1995), the papers were described as "personal papers and Metway Bank business card removed from the clothing of the deceased".

On 3 April 2023, the NSWPF advised that they could not provide a response to the Inquiry's request until they received the hard copy boxes held by the Inquiry.

Inquiry staff searched through the relevant physical boxes and were unable to locate these pieces of paper.
