	1. On Wednesday 23rd June, 1976 with Detective Walsh, I
	went to Ashfield Police Station to assist in investigations into
	the subject matter now before this Court.
	2. The deceased had been found in his home unit at 49
	Grosvenor Crescent, Summer Hill in the early hours of 23rd June,
	1976. This unit is on the 3rd floor and no forced entry was
	visible. There is only one access door, and it is necessary
	for two keys to be used to open this door when it is fully
	secured. It is fitted with a dead lock and a Yale type lock.
	It is a large block of units on the northern side of Grosvenor
	Crescent and within easy walking distance from Summer Hill
	Railway Station.
	3. Inquiries clearly indicate that the deceased met his
	death on the evening of thursday 17th June, 1976 as it was on
	that evening that voices and noises wwere heard to come from the
	unit of the deceased. On that day the deceased had met his
	friend 454 about 5pm in King Street, Newtown. They
	went to the Bank hotel there and had some drink. 1454 left
	the hotel about 6.05pm. and left the deceased at the hotel.
	Whilst at the hotel 454 gave the deceased \$20.00 and he did
	not change that money whilst in the company of 454 .
	4. When the unit of the deceased was searched amongst other
	things two TAB tickets dated 17.6.76 and purchased at the
	Summer Hill, TAB were found. Inquiries at that place were made
	from the manager Mr Mongan. He recognised a photograph of the
	deceased as being a customer who had placed bets at that place
	on previous occasions. He had no recollection of the deceased

having transacted betting transactions at the TAB on the 17.6.76

A computer check at TAB Headquarters revealed that one of

other ticket was purchased at 6.24pm that same evening. Inquiries have been made from persons who were in the TAB agency about those times but no person can recall seeing the deceased at either of those times on that day.

- 6. It is believed that it was the deceased who placed both those bets at those times. It is consistent with his habits and there is nothing to suggest that those tickets were purchased by any person other than the deceased.
- The deceased was a homosexual and actively engaged in that 7. practise. He had scores of names in his diary and almost all those persons have been interviewed and eliminated from suspicion. They are all self confessed homosexuals and go as far back as 10 years ago since having made contact with the deceased.
- Property was stolen from the premises apparently at the time 8. of the death and I produce a police circular setting out the items stolen and depicting a facsimile of some of the items. This has been circulated Australia wide and to the present time none of the property has been located. A canvass of the area and surrounds was made with negative results. I produce a police pamphlet that was distributed in the area seeking public assistance but no useful information was forthcoming from this aspect.
- A current reward was proclaimed by the Government of this State in the amount of \$10,000.00 (ten thousand) but to the present time no information is forthcoming from that aspect. There are fingerprints found on the wall near the body and there is every reason to believe that those prints are those of the person responsible for this death.
- Hundreds of persons have been interviewed and there is no evidence against any known person to justify a charge. The matter is still receiving attention and will continue to do so with a view to bringing the matter to a satisfactory conclusion.
